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How do You Ask Volunteers to take Leadership Roles?

This is the question I am often asked (or ask myself). We are continually looking for Lions to become Presidents, Secretaries, Zone Chairs, Vice District Governors and Governors. So I did what I usually do these days – I googled it. I came across some interesting information including how to write persuasive Volunteer Recruitment Appeals and Eight Questions You Should Ask Your Volunteers Regularly. But the article that I was most intrigued by was *The Seven Deadly Sins of Recruiting Volunteers* written by Thomas W. McKee. Here's a summary from that article – I know I have committed some of these!

Sin One: Expect Announcements to Get Volunteers –

Writing articles and expecting people to accept the challenge can have disappointing results. We ask ourselves - Why aren't people volunteering? The answer: many people will not volunteer, they want to be asked.

Sin Two: Go It Alone – many of us try to recruit on our own.

Try establishing a team to meet and discuss or brainstorm possible people who could fill the vacant position.

Sin Three: Recruit Life-time Individuals – Not Short-term

Project Teams – We often try to recruit Life-time individuals instead of looking for short-term commitments. People can be leery to volunteer for a position as it may result in a role they will not be able to get out of. Additionally, recruiting teams rather than individuals is particularly effective with younger volunteers.

Sin Four: Assume That "No" Means "Never" – Like most

things in life - timing is everything. A person may say "no" but it might really mean, "not right now". Consider asking again as situations change and peoples priorities can be re-arranged or shifted. Sometimes "no" means that the prospect volunteer feels that he/she would rather do something else. When the answer is "no," consider asking if there are any positions in our organization that they would love to do, but were never asked.

Half Down And Half To Go

Happy New Year, Lions!
As I write this I am struck by the reality that this will be for the January/February issue of The Border Crossing. Wow!

January! The first month of the calendar year. The turning of the calendar from 2019 to 2020.

January (in Latin, Ianuarius) is named after the Latin word for door (ianua): January is the door to the year and an opening to new beginnings.

A favorite January holiday, south of the 45th parallel, is National Nothing Day. It is best described as an "un-event" originally proposed in 1972 by columnist Harold Pullman Coffin and observed annually on January 16 since 1973. Its purpose is to provide Americans with one National day when they can just sit without celebrating, observing or honoring anything. Did you miss it?


As an aside, Canada does not seem to have a Nothing Day, at least not as a national holiday. Quite the contrary, the Realist Society of Canada (the RSC) promotes a holiday called THABS (pronounced "tabs", which stands for "There Has Always Been Something"). THABS Day is purposed to celebrating the concept that "[I]f there was ever nothing, there would be nothing now." Hmm. But THABS is a July holiday (the 8th), so we do not have to think about it anymore now.

February! The tease between winter and spring. Of course February is famous for another awakening— Groundhog Day— a tradition that has been on the books down in the States since 1886. Nowadays about 40,000 people gather annually at Gobbler's Knob in Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania (a crowd about eight times the residential population of Punxsutawney) to harass and consult Punxsutawney Phil, the groundhog therein residing, that poor, hibernating rodent who endures getting yanked out of the ground, hoisted into the open air to be awakened by a horde flashing cameras and a cheering throng of amateur weathermen every February 2.

Here in MD19, February is notable as the month of the Winter Council Of Governors meeting, the unofficial start of the second half of each Lions year. Where did the first half of our Lions year go? How did we get to the second half so soon?

The first half of Lions year 2019-20 has been a whirlwind of activities and events. Charter nights, zone meetings, cabinet meetings, celebrations, presentations, inductions, Milan, club meetings, an MD19 convention... and then some. As I get out and about MD19 I am constantly amazed by the passion of MD19 Lions, by what the Lions of MD19 do day in and day out.

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Providing Sight to the Sightless

I was asked, or rather "strongly encouraged", by our Executive Director Peter Anderson to provide an article highlighting a memorable moment as a Lion. This is my first success toward fulfilling my New Year's resolution: Doing as I am told.

Where do I start? There are so many from which to choose.

Pre-school vision screening, community food drives, Christmas parties for disadvantaged children and highway litter pick-up, just to name a few. I have chosen to showcase the Washington Council of the Blind Convention, held annually in the Seattle area.

I have volunteered at this convention for the last four years and it is an event that I look forward to. It resonates with who I am as a Lion. Helen Keller challenged us to be Knights for the Blind and how better to serve than guiding someone without sight through an unfamiliar location with a maze of hallways, rooms, elevators, stairs and restaurants. Everyday tasks we all take for granted but can be daunting for the blind. That is where volunteers come in.

We are there to guide attendees to various locations plus verbally describe raffle items, convention displays, or help with anything else they need. Have you ever thought about how or where their guide dogs relieve themselves? Yes, we lead them to the designated potty area. Can you imagine what it's like for someone without sight to navigate an airport? Locating the check-in counter, or the ground transportation area presents quite a challenge. That is where volunteers come in.

In addition to providing needed assistance, this experience has given me confidence when I encounter a visually impaired person. How do I approach them? Do they want to follow or take my arm? Which arm should they take? How do I navigate if they have a guide dog? I am now very comfortable walking up to someone and asking if they need assistance. You end up developing quite a rapport and friendship with the attendees and other volunteers. I first met the late DG Greg Vickers at my first convention. We made quite a team!

If you are given the opportunity to volunteer assisting the blind, go for it! Perhaps a training class would help you feel more confident. One of the seminars at our District Convention this year is titled "How to provide effective assistance to individuals who are visually impaired". It will be an interactive session so the participants can practice what

My Lions Youth Exchange Experience

Traveling to Spain on a Lions Club International Scholarship broadened my horizons in ways I didn't even know was possible. I had traveled internationally, but never alone. When I received this scholarship, I was sent a map covered with points scattered across the globe. Being able to decide what culture and language I wanted to experience for the summer was a greater gift than I ever could have imagined.

I was nervous about arriving in Seville, Spain. I didn't know much about my host family, and my Spanish was sub-optimal. I wondered if my family would be nice, if they would be annoyed by my dietary constraints, if they would be inviting, if they liked the things I liked. The moment I stepped off the plane I was surrounded by warm Spanish air and the sound of Flamenco music. I was greeted by my host sister, Amelia. She was easy to spot holding a big colorful sign that said "Bienvenida a Espana Emilie". We hugged, packed up the car, and headed to la casa. I immediately felt at home. They accommodated me in such a way that I felt like I was truly part of the family.

I quickly learned that Spaniards really do give two kisses on the cheek when they greet anyone...even strangers. I think this is a metaphor for their culture and people. Spaniards are fervently passionate, kind, and caring. Everywhere we went I felt welcomed, accepted. Despite being American, and knowing so little Spanish, I felt at home. Amelia and Yolanda, my host sister and mom, helped me every step of the way. My Spanish vocabulary increased more than it had in my two years of Spanish classes in High School. I too, learned to give kisses on the cheek when greeting people. We visited Lions Clubs, went shopping, took lots of photos, tried new Spanish cafes, and went to the beach. Every day was a new adventure and I enjoyed every bit of it. Not only was I learning the language, but I was learning about the people, food, culture, and enjoying a typical Spanish summer. I am a ballet dancer of fourteen years. While in El Puerto, I received a message from my old dance teacher. I knew she had moved to Spain, but I didn't know I was just thirty minutes from where she lived. We talked back and forth, and I ended up taking the train to her studio for classes and got to perform at "El Puerto en Movimiento", a production at a castle! It was a dream come true.

Upon arriving home, I was invited to go on a Medical Mission Trip with Children of the Nations. This trip was to the Dominican Republic, a predominately Spanish speaking country. I immediately accepted this opportunity. I am interested in other cultures and languages and aim to pursue a career in medicine...so this trip truly wrapped everything up perfectly! I was a 17-year old girl wearing scrubs, standing in an operating room surrounded by medical professionals and interpreters. I may have seemed out of place, but I loved learning the lingo and rules of sterilization technique. I also went to villages to test eyesight and provide prescription glasses. The poverty was absolutely striking, and I'll never forget the moment a severely nearsighted girl hugged me and told me, overwhelmed, that she could see detail for the first time. This trip would not have been possible without traveling to Spain where I overcame my fear of travelling internationally and learned so much of the language.

Thanks to my incredibly supportive host family, and the Lions Club, I was able to truly experience the best of Spain. I think that the only way to truly understand other people and cultures is to experience it for yourself. Lions Clubs International makes this possible for youth across the world and I could not be more grateful for the experiences I have been given. I will cherish my trip to Spain with LCI all my life and I cannot wait to visit Espana again!

If your club has not received an MD19 dues statement, please contact the office ASAP – md19admin@lionsmd19.org or call 360-733-4911.

Secretaries and Treasurers: Check the MD19 Website (www.lionsmd19.org) under "Toolbox" to make sure your dues were received and posted. If you've sent a check it could be that it has not been received. Check with the office to confirm.

District Spring Conferences/Conventions: The delegate/alternate voting Certification forms

Have already been sent to Lions Club Secretaries in District H.

Late February clubs in Districts D and F will be sent their forms.

Early March clubs in Districts A, B, C, E and I will be sent theirs and

In April Clubs in District G will be sent their certification forms.

Secretaries, watch for them; if you do not receive your voting certification forms at least three weeks prior to your District Conference, please call the MD19 Office and request replacements. You must have paid your club's MD19 2019-2020 First Half Dues prior to your District Conference in order for your delegates to vote.

Your PU101 (International) must be completed and **received** by LCI **AND** the MD19 Office on or before **May 15th**. How do You Ask Volunteers...con't from page 1

Sin Five: Fall Into the BIC Trap – Avoid the BIC (“Butt In the Chair”) Trap. Because we are in desperate need for a volunteer and need them quickly, we plead our case to anyone and find someone to be a “Butt In the Chair”. Often the chair is better empty than filled with the wrong person who does nothing or is high maintenance.

Sin Six: Be People Driven Rather Than Position Driven –

Another variation of the “Butt In the Chair” method is just to say, “Please come and be a part of our group. We have a great time and we need your expertise.” But we don’t tell the prospect what we want them to do. Consider -“position.” Ask, “What positions do I need to accomplish our mission?” “What do I want the team members to do?” And then I look for people who can fill those positions.

Sin Seven: Give the Position the Wrong Job Title – What’s in a name? Plenty. Ensuring the right title for the job will allow people to understand expectations around job description and skill level required.


