I would like to talk a more about Awards and Recognitions that are available in Canada and the US. In this issue, I will concentrate mostly on the Canadian side.



Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides

The Foundation trains dog guides in seven different categories and provide dogs free of charge to those in need.

They have a large selection of awards and recognitions. The most prestigious is the Judge Brian Stevenson fellowship. This is awarded for a donation of \$500. The recipient receives a certificate, medallion & and a lapel pin. In addition, they offer a JBS Progressive Fellowship for a \$500 donation. This is a way to further honor an individual who has received the JBS award. It comes with a certificate, a ruby lapel pin and a gold bar for the medallion. They also offer a Foundation Fellowship for \$250, a Life Membership for \$100 that includes a certificate and for an additional \$50 would be mounted. Lastly, they offer a Progressive Life Membership for \$100. This includes a certificate that can be upgraded as well as a pin.

BC Lions hearing Conservation Society

The Society recycles hearing aids and supports the purchase of hearing aids for those that cannot afford them. They offer a Meade Sutherland Fellowship that includes a certificate, lapel pin and a medallion for a \$500 donation.

BC Lions Society for Children with Disabilities (Easter Seals)

The Society runs camps for challenged individuals of all ages as well as operate Easter Seals House, which supplies housing to families of children from out of the Vancouver, BC area that are in BC Children's Hospital. They offer a Larry Schrodt Memorial Award for a donation to their foundation of \$500. The recipient would receive a letter, a certificate and an engraved clock.

Lions Quest Canada

The Quest supports youth to avoid bullying and make healthy choices in life. They offer a Q Bear Fan Club for a \$100 donation and for a \$500 donation a Lions Quest Fellowship.

As you can see, there are quite a few ways we can offer recognition. These are Canadian charities, but for our American Lions I am sure they would be more than happy to accept your donations too.

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KidSight NW Lions

Does your club help with Vision Screenings in your schools and/or communities? Wonder why we need to report the results? The NW Lions Foundation reports this information to an organization called Lions KidSight USA. https://www.lionskidsightusa.org/

Lions KidSight USA has been working with Lions Clubs performing vision screenings since the late 1990's. With their years of experience and experts on their Board of Directors, they have developed a comprehensive training manual so that we, Lions, can become "Specifically Trained Volunteers" to help in school settings around the USA.

We share the following data after a screening event: Number Screened, Number Referred, Age Range of Participants, and Screening Instruments Used. There is no personal information or individual results collected by any of our Lions Clubs. It is up to each school nurse or administrator to determine how they want the results reported to them, we just gather final counts.

What does Lions KidSight USA do with the information they collect? They have been using it to research trends in school reporting and children's vision. Information just like this, is what helped change the law in Washington State in 2017, so that both near and far vision screenings are now required for school aged children.

Lions Health Screening Unit

My wife, PZC Pat and I operated the 66 foot long truck and trailer used for health screenings for amost 20 years.

The LHSU is a unit that has test equipment to test adults for visual acuity, glaucoma, blood sugar (diabetes), hearing, and blood pressure. The main focus was testing kids for vision and hearing. In the 20 years that we operated the unit, approximately 35,000-40,000 adults were tested. Additionally, approximately 450,000 kids, almost exclusively kindergarten through 7th grade students were tested.

This was probably the most rewarding job I've had during my entire working career. Seeing kids and adults receive help when problems were detected made every minute worked or mile traveled worth it. I knew that money donated to the Foundation and every dollar budgeted to the LHSU was doing good. To have a teacher tell you that a student 'blossomed' when they got new glasses, made the travel and hours more than worth it.

We got to know all of Washington and Northern Idaho very well. Traveling 35,000 miles per year in trips from one day to two and one half months could be exhausting but, again it was more than worth it.

To all Lions who have contributed to the Foundation or are considering doing so, know that the money goes for a good cause. Look at a child who just got glasses and see the smile on his face. You can't help but smile with them.

In 2005, the Rathdrum Lions Club asked the Northwest Lions Foundation for help with a Patient Care Grant in the amount of \$8,500.00 for a cornea transplant for a little three year old girl. After the surgery, she looked in a mirror and made the comment that she had two brown eyes.

Now 17 years later, here is that girl. Her mother said, she never slowed down. She went through school like any other girl. In middle and high school, she played three different instruments in band. She worked for McDonald's, then went to college to become CNA. She earned her degree and now is working at a senior living home.

Her mother wants to thank the Foundation again, as for her it is a miracle that her daughter can see out of both eyes and it still hasn't slowed her down. Katelyn and her fiance, Kyle, have purchased a home and plan to marry in the summer.

This is what the money we collect for White Cane Day is used for. Katelyn is very glad that we do this, and says "Thank you"!

What Happens When an International Advocate for Women Needed a Miracle? A Divine Message Placed by a Lion Appeared



While Wendi was working to help women learn to read by the water wells in South Sudan, her eyesight started to diminish. She was going blind from Retinitis Pigmentosa.

Receiving such a tough diagnosis, she decided to go camping on her own for a week. "I didn't want to fall apart in front of my kids." From her home in Wisconsin, she went to Bridgeman, MI, camping on the sand dunes. She made a list of everything she'd miss, including the chance to someday see her grandkids' faces. The concession stand on the beach happened to have a Lions Club brochure featuring a "really cute" guide dog from Leader Dogs for the Blind. "I'd never have guessed that seven years later that organization would make a profound difference in my life."

She didn't fall apart. Continued next column

"I thanked God for saving me from a nervous breakdown.

I just decided not to give up. The inspiration I got from my refugee friends gave me the strength to go on.

I'm a storyteller and a fundraiser who's committed to positive change. I could still be that person. My life's work now has become decreasing the stigma of blindness and other disabilities caused by ableist attitudes."

Only 10% of legally blind people use a white cane or a sight dog to go places on their own. When you use these aids, she says, you gain independence, but you make your blindness known to others. "For me, coming out with my blindness gave me my life back." At first Wendi was "embarrassed" to be going blind. "Not anymore," she says. "My goal now is to help others with low or no vision remain independent." She's dedicated to combatting ableism and to improving the safety and accessibility of environments.

As baby boomers mature, Wendi says, age-related blindness is a growing concern. "I'm sounding the alarm. We're reaching a crisis point. We need many more resources to help people with sight loss stay independent."

Vital Information

The MD19 Second Half Dues statements were emailed January 11-12, 2022 to Club Treasurers or Secretary/Treasurers. If no email address available, they were mailed January 13th. Dues are based on the December 31st membership total or from the most recent WMMR received at LCI. If your club has not received an MD19 dues statement, please contact the office ASAP – md19admin@lionsmd19.org or call 360-733-4911.

Secretaries and Treasurers: Check the MD19 Website (www.lionsmd19.org) under "Toolbox>Stats" to make sure your dues were received and posted. If you've sent a check it could be that it has not yet been received. Check with the office to confirm.

District Spring Conferences/Conventions: Many of our District Conferences/Convention will be held virtually. In these cases, club secretaries will receive an email with information on their delegate allotment. They will also receive a district officer ballot with instructions on where to send the ballot.

For districts having an in-person conference delegate/alternate forms will be sent to the secretaries at least three weeks before the conference with a letter and instructions.

Regardless of whether the conference is virtual or in person the club's must have their MD19 2021-2022 First Half Dues paid prior to the District Conference in order for delegates to vote.

Club Officers for the Lions year 2022-2023 should be elected prior to April 15th. Your PU101 (International) must be completed and received by LCI AND the MD19 Office on or before May 15th. Instructions for doing the PU101 online with your clubs' MyLCI site can be found in the MD19 Contests and Awards Book under Secretary Excellence Award Rules. An AWeber notification with the instructions will also be sent in March.

Christmas Ship Cancelled

The Lions Christmas Cruise has been cancelled for the year 2021 because of UNRESOLVED issues regarding SOLAS (Safety Of Life At Sea) regulations currently in discussion between the USA and Canada governments. These are requirements for vessels carrying passengers and guests on International Waters. They will require extensive changes in vessels and their crew training. The cost is tremendous and cannot be completed in time for the Christmas Cruise.

There is no ship this side of the Great Lakes capable of qualifying in time for us. On the singularly positive side, it appears that we will be running in 2022.

Funding of MD19 Border Crossing:

Northwest Lions Foundation, Example of Community Collaboration

A few months ago the president of Lions Clubs International challenged clubs to find ways to collaborate with other community organizations on a service project. Lion Karen Ko of the Seattle First Hill Lions Club contacted the Seattle Chinatown International District Public Development Authority and the International Community Health Services (ICHS) organization to if there was away the club could participate in a project. The First Hill Club is active in their community but, because of the challenges of the last few years does not have the financial resources usually available.

A representative from ICHS shared a need to help the Seattle World School get glasses for children of immigrant and refugee families. The idea of helping these kids adjust to life in this country seemed like a perfect project for the First Hill Lions.

The New York based company Warby Parker has stores in Seattle and has made a corporate commitment to give away a pair of glasses for each pair the company sells. Warby Parker agreed to provide 20 pair of glasses for students at the school.

The next challenge for the club was to get eye exams for 20 students. The exams could be done for \$125 each for a total of \$2,500. The First Hill Club didn't have the total amount but, felt they could cover half of the cost of exams. After inquiring about funds available from different sources in District B, the First Hill request was presented to the NW Lions Foundation Board of Trustees. Although the parameters of the project were a little outside the guidelines of Foundation usual requests, at the December meeting of the Foundation Board, the request was approved on a urgent need basis. There you have it. Twenty students needing glasses, a Lions Club following through to find a way to collaborate with community organizations and the Northwest Lions Foundation helping make it possible.

A Word from Our International Director

Here we are, heading into the last half of this Lions year. One that will continue to evolve toward a time in which we can get back to a somewhat normal way of doing business and interacting with each other. Zooming works but, being in person is better.

I know that currently the MD19 Strategic Planning Committee is continuing to work on a redistricting plan directed by the Council of Governors. Having been through this once before in this MD and being an observer in other MDs it is not an easy task. There are times when the entire committee must feel like a group of lion tamers, in a cage, with real african lions. Any change is a challenge but, as has been said many times, we need an open mind. A mind is like a parachute if it isn't open, it isn't working.



Our Vision statement is "To be the global leader in community and humanitarian service"; our Motto is "We Serve". As most of you know, I serve as the Chairperson of the Lions International Service and Activities Committee. We look at service that is reported on a very regular basis. One of the interesting things I see is, in those areas where Lions are out visibly serving, we are attracting new members. Where we are not out visibly serving our communities, we are struggling to maintain the members that we have. Service also gives our members a purpose in this time of somewhat challenging mental attitudes, getting out and serving in any capacity benefits our attitudes as well. Serving is a win-win and reporting it makes it even better.

One of the other areas covered by the Service and Activities Committee is advocacy. The committee is responsible for Lions Day on Capital Hill in Washington DC, Lions Day at the UN, and other Lions Days around the world. We have a first Lions Day on Parliament Hill coming up this fall, where we will be acquainting the federal politicians with what we Lions are all about. In the USA, the government has reached out to Lions to assist with the Afghan resettlement program where we have been asked to help integrate Afghan families into USA society. The Afghans involved all had a direct relationship to supporting the US military when they were in Afghanistan. This is a purely humanitarian effort, nothing more or less. At the end of the day, it is anticipated that any club that becomes involved will be zero dollars out of pocket. If you have questions, please contact me.

Speaking of dollars and conventions, our vision is to have the first face-to-face convention since Milan, in Montreal. The DGs of the current year who did not get to go to an International Convention can register for this convention for a significantly reduced price. Voting this year will be electronic however, you need to be registered to vote. One of the items on the ballot is a carry over from Singapore (the one that never happened). This item is a dues adjustment of \$7 over three years starting in July 2023, the first year is a \$3 (USD) increase followed by two \$2 (USD) increases. By the end of this proposed adjustment, our dues will still be lower than what the other major service organizations in the world currently are.

I was recently at an event where many Lions were inducted into our association. One of the speakers spoke of the key to success as a leader, it is simply, show up. Remember that We Serve a World in Need. We Serve from the Heart.
