

Due to the restrictions imposed by Washington State in support of the COVID-19 pandemic mitigation strategy, few opportunities existed for retreats. However, we were able to find two opportunities in 2020.

The Law Enforcement/Veteran Retreat

After a great deal of research and planning, we identified a suitable location for a three-day Law Enforcement Officer (LEO)/Veteran retreat that offered enough space to maintain the mandated six-foot social distance requirement while also housing four families. Project New Hope funded and facilitated the retreat at the Suncadia Resort in Cle Elum, WA. We rented an amazing four-bedroom house complete with an outdoor fire pit, hot tub, and gorgeous forest scenery flush with wildlife. The resort proved to be a quiet place for meditation and reflection. The environment was relaxing, soothing, and presented the perfect conditions for emotional healing and relationship reconciliation.

Three LEO/veteran families attended the retreat; the fire pit became the focal point of the men, facilitating the ideal atmosphere for peer-to-peer mentorship. The stillness and quiet chatter of the forest, as well as the slow dance of flames at the fire pit, created the perfect recipe for transparency and the eventual release of vulnerabilities. The safe space generated at the fire pit allowed the men to open their hearts and share many long-held and often dark secrets. The safe space liberated the men from much anger, fear, and loneliness.

Similarly, the women gathered around the kitchen table, enjoying their morning coffee, afternoon tea, and all-day snacking while also bonding and encouraging the vulnerability to share their personal issues. They too were able to break through many barriers and develop a kinship that facilitated emotional healing and strong friendships.

National Guard Family Respite

Although not officially a retreat in and of itself, another opportunity arose to assist to a National Guard family in need of immediate housing. Project New Hope rented a thirty-five foot camper trailer and a campsite, with all amenity hook-ups, for a three-day respite. Project New Hope also provided food and personal hygiene items for the entire family. We provided a counseling session to ensure the family was stable and all physical and emotional needs were addressed. The respite proved to be effectual as the family is progressing well physically, emotionally, and financially.

In conclusion, we are sorry we could not do more, as scheduled. Although we held a few small retreats, we have been very active on Joint Base Lewis McChord, helping soldiers during these unusual times. Through our partnership with Heroes Challenge, we had a clothing drive, food drive, toy drive, helped service dogs, participated in the Thanksgiving Turkey Drop and Ham Grenade program, a Welcome Home event, and many more.

Access Technology Affordability Act in the House

Although Lions is a service organization and not involved in politics, this press release below shows one of the many things that are important to blind families, students and employees. The introduction of this bill is a great step in the right direction for us.

FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE

National Federation of the Blind Applauds the Introduction of the Access Technology Affordability Act in the House

Baltimore, Maryland (January 22, 2021): The National Federation of the Blind, the oldest and largest nationwide organization of blind Americans, applauds the introduction of the Access Technology Affordability Act (ATAA) (H.R. 431) in the United States House of Representatives by Select Revenue Measures Subcommittee Chairman Mike Thompson (D-CA-5) and Representative Mike Kelly (R-PA-16). This legislation removes an employment barrier commonly experienced by blind Americans who cannot afford the high cost of access technology by creating a refundable tax credit in the amount of \$2,000 to be used over a three-year period to offset the cost of these technologies.

Mark A. Riccobono, President of the National Federation of the Blind, said: "My wife, my two daughters, and I are all blind, and the children's technology needs will increase as they complete their education and start their careers. My family is not unique; blind people across the nation face this challenge, and this legislation will provide critical assistance. We thank and commend Chairman Thompson and Representative Kelly for continuing to be champions for this act, which will help give blind people the technology they need to live the lives they want."

CARE Projects



HONDURAS PROJECT – YEAR 1 (grant received from MD19 in the fall of 2019)

This grant was used to provide food assistance to families in 2020, in response to the COVID-19 crisis. This is what I reported on in my October 2020 presentation. A portion of funds was reserved by CARE to set-up community gardens once government regulations allow for this kind of activity/gathering. CARE expects to begin working with the communities on the gardens in April 2021.

HONDURAS PROJECT – YEAR 2 (grant received from MD19 in the fall of 2020)

CARE has received the funding from MD19 and will be distributing food assistance to new families at the end of March 2021. I will be happy to share new photos from this event. Additionally, funds will again be reserved from this grant to use for community gardens. And as noted above, this activity has been on hold until government regulations permit CARE to begin. We anticipate to start working with the communities on implementing the gardens in April 2021.

HAITI PROJECT – MD19 is currently fundraising for the new project in Haiti. With funds raised this year by MD19, CARE will be able to support out-of-school children in Haiti (especially girls who are more likely to miss out on school) helping them get into a classroom and resume education. With COVID-19 and school closures, the risk is especially great for kids not returning to school and this will harm poor communities long-term. So we are particularly grateful that funds from MD19 will support these vulnerable children in Haiti next year. But please note: This project had NOT STARTED. CARE will receive the donation from MD19 in the fall of 2021. Then, the project start-up at the end of 2021, but we won't have anything to report on activity-wise to MD19 until 2022.

Vital Information

District Conferences / Conventions are underway. Last year, since all conferences were cancelled it was determined to give every officer credit for 'attending' their conference. This year we are asking that you fill out a visitation report form and let us know which officers from your club attended what may be all Zoom conferences.

Remember: Since elections will still take place for district officers, your club must have paid the MD19 first half dues. A list is sent to the elections committee for each district showing which clubs are still owing for first half. They may contact you for confirmation of payment.

The **2021-22 PU101 Report Form** is due in the MD19 Office on or before **April 15 (or as soon as you hold your club election)**. If you did not receive the information on how to do the PU101, via AWeber in March, you can download the form (editable PDF) found on the MD19 Website (www.lionsmd19.org) under "Forms" (main page) and save the form (found on the next page) to your computer. Fill out the form, save completed form and email to the MD19 Office as an attachment. Email address: md19lions@lionsmd19.org. Hard copies mailed to 4141 W. Maplewood Avenue, Bellingham, WA 98226. For those secretaries for whom we have no email information, you should have received a hard copy from MD19 sometime in March.

Please send a copy of your PU101 Report Form to your current 1st Vice District Governor and Zone Chairperson. Before sending to the MD19 Office or anyone else, double check with all your incoming club officers to make sure the information provided on the form is correct and update your club officer's information via MyLCI if necessary. If your club has a P.O. Box, ask your officers if they want their mail delivered to the club P.O. Box or to their personal home or business address.

If all information is not available, send what you can. Call the MD19 Office if you need assistance. **Remember:** The International PU101 goes to LCI and to the **MD19 Office**. The form allows the new officer information to be provided to the current 1st VDG (your incoming DG) and the Zone Chairperson.

Club Officer Training: As was done last year, online club officer training will be provided and information will be sent out by those conducting the training. See leadership article on the front page for dates.

The MD19 2021 Club Officer Manuals are available on the MD19 Website under "Toolbox" and then "Learning". They can be downloaded and kept on your computer for quick reference. They are still being updated but that will be completed shortly.

MD19 Awards forms for Club President and Membership Director Excellence Awards are available on the MD19 website (Toolbox>Forms>Club Report Forms). An AWeber message will be sent as a reminder shortly. These forms need to be sent to the MD19 Office by July 25, 2021. Officers and Clubs that meet the criteria for the MD19 Awards will receive their recognition at the MD19 Annual Convention in Penticton, B.C. in October. **There is no form to fill out for the Club Secretary Recognition of Excellence nor for the Zone Chairperson Recognition of Excellence.** The criteria for these awards are tracked by MD19 throughout the year.

Lions Clubs International (LCI) has a Club Excellence Award. Longtime Inspirational Columnist Garners Rotary Unsung Citizen of Penticton Award

The Rotary Club of Penticton Sunrise recently honored Harvie Barker, a widely read and greatly admired volunteer Columnist of the Penticton Herald, with its Unsung Citizen of Penticton Award. The Award aims to highlight area residents who have quietly undertaken altruistic deeds that serve to enrich our social tapestry and create a more vibrant, equitable and inclusive community.

Awardees also become Paul Harris Fellows, so named in memory of the renowned founder of the Rotary movement. Conferring honorary PHF recognition requires that our Club donate US\$1,000, in the name of the recipient, to The Rotary Foundation in support of its many laudable humanitarian and educational projects around the globe. Accordingly, Barker joins the ranks of such international luminaries as Mother Theresa, Nelson Mandela, Jimmy Carter and Jonas Salk.

Harvie Barker was honored for his tireless 18-year devotion to writing impactful inspirational newspaper messages under "A Good Word in Season" theme that have been widely sold as soft-covered booklets with all proceeds going to charity.

Upon retiring in Penticton in 2003, Barker decided to continue writing his musings but this time to craft the messages so as to avoid using religious language but remain spiritual in nature and thereby reach a far broader readership with the same meaning. Having settled on this game-changing approach, he then needed a publisher and found a kindred spirit in local businessman Andre Martin, who at the time was the General Manager of the Penticton Herald.

A partnership was forged in which Barker would contribute an article every second week, carefully proofread by his wife, Liz, beginning December 16, 2003. By July 1, 2005, the first 40 articles had accumulated, and arrangements were made to publish them as "A Good Word in Season" soft-covered booklet. Layout and editing were done by the Production Department of the Penticton Herald and local sponsors were found by Harvie to defray publication costs.

A resounding success indeed by any yardstick with over 400 messages in nine volumes of booklets published and over \$28,000 raised for two worthy charities to date. Barker has continued to write for the Herald less frequently, and has enough unpublished columns, energy permitting, to produce another booklet.

Barker's induction into community service dates back to 1967 when he joined the Lions Club of Port Cartier, PQ, and he has served with distinction and dedication ever since, including being both President and Secretary of the Penticton Lions Club.

Current Club President Margaret Ashley said, "Thoughtful, kind and insightful, Harvie is always ready to exemplify the Lions motto "We Serve" when needed, from serving pancakes, selling tickets or just taking the time to listen."

As Rotarians, we hasten to add that his humanitarian deeds likewise epitomize our "Service above Self" motto, making him eminently worthy of the Unsung Citizen of Penticton Award in the eyes of two international service organizations.

HISTORY OF THE CARE - LIONS CLUBS RELATIONSHIP

CARE INTERNATIONAL

CARE began in 1946 when it distributed surplus military rations to the needy of war-torn Europe. The initials originally stood for "Cooperative for American Remittances to Europe" but have been changed to "Cooperative for Assistance and Relief for Everywhere." With offices today in Australia, Canada, Denmark, France, Germany, United Kingdom, Italy, Japan, Norway and the U.S., the organization is now called "CARE." Each branch of CARE is referred to as CARE plus the country name, such as CARE-Canada, CARE-Italy, etc.

HISTORY OF LIONS CLUBS/CARE RELATIONSHIP

Lions Clubs International joined forces with CARE in 1946 by raising funds to send CARE Packages to post-war Europe. As CARE shifted its focus to developing nations in the fifties, Lions Clubs increased their support of CARE. In 1952 Lions Clubs International took its first official action by recommending CARE as a channel for helping victims of the Korean War. By 1957 Lions were so active that they were invited to become a member agency of CARE's Board of Directors. Lions-CARE "Friend-Ship" was celebrated in 1967 in honor of Lions' 50th anniversary. German Lions raised almost half a million dollars in 1972 in their "Dank an CARE" campaign, a response to CARE's assistance following World War II. Lions Clubs of North America set a record in 1980 when they contributed over \$320,000 to CARE.

MD-19 LIONS/CARE HISTORY

MD-19 Lions began its affiliation with CARE in 1951, by supporting CARE's relief efforts through Lions Clubs International. During the fifties Lions Clubs International operated humanitarian projects in developing countries similar to CARE's projects. MD-19 Lions determined that CARE, with its ability to leverage additional funds, was able to provide services at one-third the cost of the Lions' projects. MD-19 Lions entered into an agreement with the Northwest CARE office in 1958 to provide direct support of CARE projects chosen by the group. For several years this relationship was unique among Lions Clubs and attracted attention because of its success.

SUMMARY

Over the years, MD-19 Lions, Lionesses and Leos have provided over \$1.2 million in support of CARE projects around the world. This makes them one of the largest private contributors to CARE in the history of its organization. These contributions have enabled millions of needy people to improve their health and standard of living. This consistent dedication to serving others has made MD-19 Lions a valuable partner in CARE's efforts to improve self-sufficiency and well-being in developing countries. This is a unique program in Lionism, of which MD-19 Lions can surely be proud.
