Leadership Corner

As we wrap up 2022, let's take a moment to remember the first six months of our Club Lion's year accomplishments and how you made a difference in your communities.

Did you make your presence as Lions visible to your community? Are you marketing your club projects? Are you inviting the community to participate in your club projects? It is not about recognition, but about visibility of your Lions Service Projects...so your community knows where to turn for help. Let me use my club, Lacey Sunrise Lions, to illustrate how invisible we can become. My club puts up 600-800 American flags in our local community during special holidays: Memorial Day, 4th of July, Veteran's Day, Labor Day, etc. Often times, the community contacts the City Council about missing or damaged flags, or to just say thank you for putting up the flags. So many times, even the City Council members do not know where the flags are coming from...the knowledge of the flag source is lost in the leadership turn-over and can be forgotten over time.

This can also happen in our Club leadership transition. An opportunity to strengthen our community awareness is to train our potential and incoming club leaders in our projects: the history, the purpose, the value, volunteer opportunities. Celebrate the difference made in your community. With knowledge and understanding, your members may be more inclined to step into leadership roles. Also, by opening up volunteer opportunities to community members, we could be enticing new members to become a part of our Lions team...growing our membership.

As we enter into this holiday season, many of our clubs are doing wonderful service projects: collecting food, toys, etc., to help those in need. Something to consider is what can you do to make sure your missing members are not forgotten: sending a special holiday card, maybe dropping off a prepared meal, just spending some time visiting, having a get together, pick up members to attend a meeting or get together social hours...let them know they are not forgotten.

From the Archives

The document shown here is the program from the 1984 Dedication of the Multiple District 19 Office. While the building itself was purchased in 1983, and the moving occurred on December 5, the dedication was held in much more reasonable weather in July. Gordon F. Smith was elected Cabinet Secretary in 1960, and for 24 years, operated out of the family garage.

This purchase was initiated during a Council of Governors' meeting in July 1981 that created a Long-range planning Committee tasked with studying the need to build, or lease an MD19 office, OR to allow the MD19 Secretary to work from home, where ever that might be. In July of 1982 the committee (then Past Council Chair Ray Sheward, Council Chair Dennis Gudbranson, and Council Chair Elect Roger Richert recommended the purchase of a property, located in northern Bellingham, next to the freeway, and in the vicinity of the airport.

As we know, that building was purchased and was occupied and now, 39 years later I can confirm that PCC Ray died several years ago, but PCC Dennis was recognized by his club Bellingham Central, as its longest Serving Lion. He joined in 1968 and has been a member there for 54 years. Roger Richert, now a Past International Director, has been a Lion for 58 years and is still active with the Renton Lions Club.

Christmas Schedule for MD19 Office

The MD19 Office is closed December 24th – January 2nd. The Office will be open for business at 8:00 am on January 3, 2023. While closed, we will periodically try to respond to emails that have the MD19 Visitation Forms, ZC items and candidate letters of Intent and Endorsements attached to them so that you will know that they have been received in the office by the deadline of December 31st. The date/time stamp on the email will also validate its on time submission.

In mid-January the MD19 Office will be **emailing** out to the Club Treasurers or Secretary-Treasurers the **MD19 Second Half Dues Statements**. If no email address is available, a hard copy will be sent to the Treasurer's address as it was recorded on the 2022-2023 LCI Club Officer Report Form (or subsequent updated information received). If you do not receive a dues statement by the end of January, please contact the MD19 Office, so that we can confirm your email or mailing address and resend the bill. Dues for the second half are based on the membership total recorded on the WMMR due December 31, 2022, plus pro-rated dues for any new members brought in from July to December.

District Conferences / Conventions begin the weekend of March 24th. It is important that the 2022-2023 First Half Dues have been paid prior to your conference or your voting Delegate(s) will be unable to vote. If you have not received a 2022-2023 First Half Dues statement, contact the MD19 Office for a copy immediately. Please confirm your club's correct contact information with the MD19 Office at the same time.

Voting at District Conferences: Elections will be held at each of the District Spring Conferences/Conventions for the 2023-2024 Council Chairperson and Vice Council Chairperson. The ballot boxes containing the ballots for Council and Vice Council Chairpersons will remain sealed until all of the conferences/conventions have been held. After the close of the final conference/convention, all the ballots will be counted at the same time.

Candidates for Higher Office at the Zone level: Your letter of intent and your club's letter of endorsement must be received by the MD19 Office, the District Governor and your Zone Chairperson on or before December 31st. This is a Constitutional requirement!

Any Candidate for MD19 Vice Council Chairperson: Your letter of Intent, your Club's Letter of Endorsement and <u>your Zone's Letter of Endorsement</u> must be received by the MD19 Office, the District Governor, and the Vice District Governor on or before December 31st. This is a Constitutional requirement!
