Redistricting

Redistricting Challenges and Opportunites Await. Will Your District Be Ready?

In The Strategic Planning Committee’s last report to the council of Governors in June, we wrote these words to describe the emerging importance of redistricting MD19:

“The Strategic Planning Committee has concluded that MD19 is rapidly approaching a critical point in its history that, absent a significant reversal of membership and leadership trends, redistricting will be the only option remaining for MD19 to effectively continue serving its Lions. As result, the committee feels it would be remiss to simply kick the problems, and the viable solutions to those problems, down the road. Simply put, the time has come to face a very real possibility that redistricting MD19 will be necessary.”

At that June 2021 meeting, the Council approved the plan to implement a full redistricting plan for consideration to the clubs and districts of MD19, and to place it on the ballot at a special MD19 Virtual Meeting some time in May or June of 2022.

At this point in the process, the urgent need for redistricting continues. Quite frankly, we are behind in our District preparations. While we have populated the MD19 website with documents pertaining to redistricting, we only have a few months to finalize the full plan and get it ready to be reviewed by each of our nine districts.

That said, it is imperative that Districts organize and mobilize merger committees to begin discussions with their merger counterpart(s). Some Districts have already begun to do so and are well along the way. Other districts have not come up to speed yet, and we need to fully engage those districts. Beginning on October 19, we will expand our Zoom meetings to weekly events and invite all the Merger Committee members from each of the nine districts to participate in those information sharing meetings.

Currently, he lives in Nelson with his wife Jennifer Edgar. They enjoy travel and camping. Their blended family includes five children and two grandchildren.



A Word from our International Director

Here we are nearly a quarter of the way through this Lions year. This Lions year really isn't anything like last year and hopefully won't be like next year. So how are we doing? Are we adapting to doing things differently or are we simply waiting it out and hoping for the best?



I have been asked about what I'm doing in my third year as an International Director. Each year has been very different from the previous one. There really hasn't been a lot of time spent doing nothing though. Some of the things that I have been working on are:

- Communication. A Lions of Canada webpage has been developed as a landing pad for the public as well as Lions members. The link to the page can be found on the front page of the MD19 webpage. There is a wide variety of information there that is useable by any Lion or Lions Club.
- Marketing. While the GAT group is looking at Marketing as well, our thrust is more external marketing. We are attempting to dispel the vision that Lions are the "Best Kept Secret". Posters have been developed; they can be found in the Resource area and are regularly used in Australia. Feel free to use them. The use of Facebook is being encouraged to publicize what Lions Clubs are doing. Go to the Lions of/du Canada Facebook page to have a look. Feel free to share information with your friends, even those who are not Lions yet!
- Advocacy. This is an area where some very significant work is happening. There are Canadian specific training happening to assist with Campaign 100, Membership and Fund development. A Canadian Lions Day on Parliament Hill is in the planning stages and will be presented to the International Board for funding approval at the October board meeting. While we are a global organization, we are also an organization made up of people from many countries. Strategies that work in the USA or Korea don't necessarily fit here and vice versa.

Another area that we are paying attention to is Mental Health. Self harm is a growing issue and suicide is one of the leading causes of death, globally. We are seeing discussion happening amongst some of the major sports teams as some of their members unexpectedly take that final step. With the anxiety driven by this pandemic, the real figures are likely to increase. It is a subject that is never



spoken of in our society. My own brother took his life last year, so this is a subject I'm getting more familiar with.

Crossing the US/Canadian Border

As of this writing, the Canadian Government has open the border August 9, to fully vaccinated travelers from the U.S.A. It has also published a [list of requirements](#) for non-essential travelers to get through the border. All travelers, regardless of vaccination status, will still require a pre-entry COVID-19 molecular test result. However effective August 9, 2021, the Government of Canada is adjusting its post-arrival testing strategy for fully vaccinated travelers. Using a new border testing surveillance program at airports and land border crossings, fully vaccinated travelers will not need a post-arrival test unless they have been randomly selected to complete a Day 1 COVID-19 molecular test. There are no changes to the mandatory testing requirements for unvaccinated travelers.

All travelers must use ArriveCAN (app or web portal) to submit their travel information. If they are eligible to enter Canada and meet specific criteria, fully vaccinated travelers will not have to quarantine upon arrival in Canada. All travelers, with limited exceptions, whether entering Canada by air or land, must use ArriveCAN. You'll need to submit your information within 72 hours before your arrival to Canada.

Vital Information

CLUB DUES: MD19 First Half Dues for 2021-22 are past due. If the Treasurer or Secretary/Treasurer did not receive a dues statement, please contact the MD19 Office.

ANNUAL CONVENTION: This will be a virtual convention. Information for registering is found in this issue of the Border Crossing.

CLUB OFFICER CHANGES: Please inform the MD19 Office right away when there is a change in your club President, Secretary or Treasurer. The new officer information will be included in the Cut-n-Paste section of The Border Crossing and the master mailing list will be updated for future mailings from the MD19 Office. We do not receive the information from LCI when you only post a change on the LCI website.

SUBMITTING THE CLUBS' WMMR: Club Secretaries need to be aware that if no membership changes have occurred in the month of the report they STILL NEED TO GO ONLINE and indicate that nothing has changed by clicking on "Report no Membership Changes for (current month)" under the 'task' section on their clubs' MyLCI site. Otherwise they will not be given credit for submitting a report for that month.

Backdated information for the previous two months submitted during the next month will not be considered the missing months' report. Submitting the information is good for keeping accurate membership records. That is important and encouraged, but you won't receive credit for submitting the MMR that was not submitted by the last day of the specific month.

When submitting your report for the month it is better to submit earlier in the month in case there are internet issues with LCI on the last day of the month.

ZONE MEETINGS (District Governor Advisory Meeting): You probably have attended your first zone meeting for the 2021-22 year. And more than likely it's been a Zoom Meeting. Zone Chairpersons are required to report which Presidents and Secretaries (and Alternates if applicable) attended the meeting. **It is important** that you also record your club's attendance at the zone meeting on your Club's Monthly Visitation Form, indicating that the President and Secretary were in attendance. This is in case the Zone Chairperson does not send in the required report.

The Lions Christmas Cruise has been cancelled for the year 2021 because of UNRESOLVED issues regarding SOLAS (Safety Of Life At Sea) regulations currently in discussion between the USA and Canada governments. These are requirements for vessels carrying passengers and guests on International Waters. They will require extensive changes in vessels and their crew training. The cost is tremendous and cannot be completed in time for the Christmas Cruise.

There is no ship this side of the Great Lakes capable of qualifying in time for us. On the singularly positive side, it appears that we will be running in 2022.
